Welcome and Introductions

Meeting called to order @ 5:30pm, introductions were made around the table.

Safety Orientation

Jennifer reviewed safety procedures.

WFP Updates:

Jim Muress – PAFO Operations

- Last update, Jim reported five contractors in place and picking up momentum. Logging was curtailed due to the Forest fires this summer. Due to the loss of logging and undercut situation, PAFO has picked up one more harvest contractor.
- During the storm last weekend, it rained about 200mm in the North Fork area. The road damage and slides shut down production for two days and will continue to be slow this week
- Met with the Mayor and Ron today, felt it was positive and good energy.
- Jim thanked the members who volunteered at the Fall Fair.

Goshawk Presentation Manager, Stewardship & Engagement at TimberWest, Molly Hudson

- Side note IT and TimberWest have affiliated as of last week, not a lot of details as of yet, but will be working as one company in the future. The slide in the presentation showing TimberWest's land base does not include this amalgamation.
- Working with Genome BC will be providing an updated map of the habitat of Goshawks and their sub-species in the near future
- Closed canopy question can be subject to some predation when the birds are small and vulnerable from owls like the Barn or Grey Horned, maybe ravens. Goshawk babies grow fast and Goshawks are quite defensive of their nest site.
- Goshawks seem to be foraging and verging out over the winter. Goshawks have been spotted in Washington area
- Management of the Crown and Private land Question -management is seamless, except private land information is not shared with the government.

Goshawk and Marbled Murrelet Presentation Senior Biologist at WFP, John Deal

Goshawk

- Question if Port Alberni means TFL 44 yes, 14 nests confirmed in Port Alberni/TFL 44
- Non-contributing land base would be made up of wildlife habitat, riparian, ungulate etc...
- Action Item 1 when the manuscript is posted, let the WIWAG members know the link
- The real range of the subspecies will hopefully be determined by the genetics study. The results will not change anything right away. The results could change the protection status of the bird, but realistically could take 3-5 years. Until then, the implemented strategy plan is in place.
- Crown and Private land can be managed differently. All federally regulated conditions can be met on crown land.
- Question what happens when a Goshawk nest is found? All logging activities are stopped, immediately. A biologist is brought in to confirm and identify where the nests are.

Murrelet

- With the case studies John is working with, he is finding smaller patches of murrelet habitat are brought into larger patches due to the close proximity of the smaller patches, then manage the area as one unit.
- Crown land first strategy, not private land. If the habitat is critical on private land, then
 the private land owner is to be compensated by the government. Private land is not regulated by the government.
- Diet of the Marbled Murrelet has changed and weather conditions influence the bird's patterns as well.

Highlights of the external audit of Stillwater in April/ Future of CSA and WFP's commitment to maintaining WIWAG Certification Coordinator at WFP, Will Sloan

External Audit of Stillwater – focused on the new standards. Going forward, the audit report summaries will be found on the corporate website, rather than individual operations sites. Action item 2 – let the WIWAG members know when the report is posted

- Stillwater did pass certification, auditors did find some issues.
- The audit found a disconnect between Corporate and Stillwater offices with reporting
- Bridge inspection program had some opportunities for improvement due to retirement and the person not being replaced
- Not all culverts were functioning properly
- Audits can take up to a week, and usually 4-5 auditors. They have their own matrix to follow, as well, that dictates days and auditors required.
- How is their Public Advisory Group (CAG) set up? A less traditional set up for their advisory group, but it works for them. Two people share Erin's role.
- Port Alberni will be audited sometime in the last two weeks of May. Discussion of having the WIWAG meeting during the audit, then the auditors can attend and have their own discussion with the group. If not, then the auditors will contact a few members if you put your name forward, won't have time to interview everyone.
- There is nothing wrong with not meeting a target, as it encourages continual improvement
- CSA certified, 9 companies left, 10-12 million hectares. WFP plans to continue with CSA for as long as it's viable.
